Food & Water Watch is a new consumer advocacy organization that challenges the corporate control and abuse of our food and water resources. We engage in research, public and policymaker education, media, and lobbying on the local, national and international levels. We advocate the development of food systems that guarantee safe, wholesome food produced in a humane and sustainable manner; inform citizens about the dangers posed by industrialized agriculture and aquaculture; and protect people and the environment by preventing the shift of control of water resources including oceans, rivers and groundwater, from the public to private corporations.

### Food

Sustainable and local; chemical free; humanely raised; family farmed; clearly labeled--that's what we want. Factory farms for animals and fish; dangerous practices that lead to diseases like mad cow; and risky technologies like irradiation—that's what we are fighting to prevent.

### Water

The right to water for people and nature; safe, affordable and publicly controlled; citizen participation; investment in infrastructure - that's what we want. Privatization of fresh water and ocean resources; pollution and depletion of water resources by agriculture and industry - that's what we are fighting to prevent.

## Who We Are: Biographies of Key Staff

Wenonah Hauter is the Executive Director of Food & Water Watch. She has worked extensively on energy, food, water and environmental issues at the national, state and local level. Experienced in developing policy positions and legislative strategies, she is also a skilled and accomplished organizer, having lobbied and developed grassroots field strategy and action plans. From 1997 to 2005 she served as Director of Public Citizen's Energy and Environment Program, which focused on water, food, and energy policy. From 1996 to 1997, she was Environmental Policy Director for Citizen Action, where she worked with the organization's 30 state-based groups. From 1989 to 1995 she was at the Union of Concerned Scientists where as a Senior Organizer, she coordinated broad-based, grassroots sustainable energy campaigns in several states.
